

A Journey of Faith

My name is Florence Petrovic LaPrath, 'Flo' to some of you, to 4th Grade Religious Ed Students I am 'Mrs. LaPrath'. Truthfully in my agreeing to become a Catechist some years ago, I disciplined myself to deeper study in learning more about our Catholic faith, in mind of my responsibility to teach others without errors of ignorance. I've loved learning! Those of you who are parents do this for & with your children. Through the years I have been enriched by formal Bible Studies, valuable online courses - The Bible & The Catechism of the Catholic Church in a Year, Hallow, Amen, many books which give me access to REFERENCES for the times when I 'forget facts' can't quite express something or seek answers to my own questions for greater clarity & prayer. You'll no doubt agree, putting the Eucharist & our prayers first not only enhances but 'amazingly e-x-p-a-n-d-s time' rather than shortening it. In conversations with friends who embrace other faiths or in my travels I understand I will encounter many viewpoints. Some people focus on Jesus only, some wrestle with the concept of God altogether - a few e

What is a Mission Field?

A Mission Field is a designated geographical region for which we are accountable for introducing Jesus Christ and our Catholic Faith. The mission field includes all of the individuals, families, Catholic communities and civic communities in our area. Our Mission Field includes not just the parishes and Catholic families in our region but all the people and communities here, from Hoyt Lakes to Mt. Iron.

Why are we operating as a Mission Field?

This will make mission initiatives manageable, doable and accountable. Our Mission Field does not replace existing structures, rather it allows us to work together with more resources and opportunities in a way that reflects the shared life of the communities we live in and serve.

Will my parish be closed?

No! Our Mission Field includes Our Lady of Hope parish in Aurora, St Joseph's parish in Gilbert, Resurrection parish in Eveleth and Holy Spirit Parish in Virginia. None of these parishes will be closed, rather we hope and pray they will grow in even greater vibrancy in the days ahead due to this new Mission Field model.

Are our parishes being merged?

No. Our Lady of Hope, St Joseph's, Resurrection and Holy Spirit will continue to operate as separate parishes in our Mission Field. Yet, we will strive to grow in collaboration with one another, on Mission to bring healing, hope and joy to our entire region! We will be much stronger and more effective as we work together in the days ahead.

Which priest will be covering which Masses in our Mission Field?

At this point, we are discerning and discussing which priest will be covering which Masses. We are striving to work towards a more consistent schedule, but this will take some time. Our goal is that by October 1, we will have a good routine for our priests, deacons and parishioners. Our hope is that every parish will get to experience the blessing of each priest, serving in our Mission Field, at Mass, on a regular basis.

I heard we can put our giving envelopes in any weekend Mass collection in our Mission Field, and it will return to the parish I am registered at. Is this true?

Yes. If you are at a different weekend Mass than the parish you are registered at, in our Mission Field, you can put your envelope in that collection and the envelope will get back to your specific parish.

Bethany House is a new missionary community of women seeking to bring the Healing, Hope, and Joy of Jesus to our Mission Field through prayer, community life, and service. In imitation of Mary of Bethany, who sat at the feet of Jesus and poured out her life in imitation of His Eucharistic heart, the women of Bethany place themselves before Jesus' loving gaze to be transformed into His image "from glory to glory" by the Holy Spirit, equipped with His Power and Peace, and sent with missionary zeal and joy into our spheres of influence: our jobs, our friendships, the people we encounter in ordinary life. Simply, we desire to make a home for Jesus in our hearts and bring the Healing, Hope, and Joy of His presence to the world.

Bethany is a place for young women to come and rest in Jesus' heart as they discover the "next step" with Him. The women of Bethany live community life together, receive formation and discipleship, and grow in the gifts God has given them for the world through a variety of missional opportunities.

This year, the Bethany community is growing into two houses with six women total: a House of Formation for post-high school women and a House of Mission for post-college women. The Bethany community prays together, shares meals together, and moves on mission together while living in separate homes.

National Eucharistic Congress: Planting Seeds

Attending daily mass with thousands of catholic brothers and sisters, hundreds of religious brothers and sisters, seminarians, deacons, priests, bishops, and archbishops is amazing to say the least. The main-session speakers were informative, inspiring, bold, and unifying. The speakers in the breakout sessions were outstanding, the praise and worship music had something for everyone to enjoy and be moved by. The most impactful moments were during adoration. Each night was supernatural.

The Holy Spirit filled the arena and thousands of hearts during eucharistic adoration. It was seen and felt. During adoration, in an arena potentially filled with 50,000 people, it was silent. At times, I would close my eyes and enter into the silence. Upon my eyes opening I was stunned every time by the realization of how many people were calm, peaceful, and adoring Jesus in the arena. I am by nature an introvert, so, in some sense, observing what happens around me feels like I am participating. I will share with you some of the differences I observed between living in the secular world and a culture filled with people living in faith and walking with Jesus daily. Encountering others was a joyful experience. People made eye contact while talking, asked questions which led to conversation, smiled, and laughed as they walked through the halls to their destination; opened doors or offered seating to others; families were together and enjoying each other, children were well behaved, caring, helpful towards their brothers and sisters; everyone cleaned up after themselves, there was no trash laying around anywhere. People were praying with others. Jesus was present everywhere. I saw Him in the faces of so many. One of the goals of this Eucharistic Revival is teaching us how to become missionaries. Go out and evangelize. This can sound extremely uncomfortable for some - It makes me uncomfortable - yet if you break it down it becomes doable. This doesn't require us to run up to strangers and ask if they have met Jesus and go into a tangent of why they need to. It requires us to be loving, caring, and engaging with others. To give witness and testimony in any situation. It can be an encounter with a fellow catholic, a family member who is struggling, or one who has fallen away from God or the church; it can be a friend or someone you barely know. If we plant seeds everywhere some will be fruitful. Check out "Walk with One" www.eucharisticrevival.org/walk-with-one to discern how God is calling you to bring more souls to know Jesus Christ. This pilgrimage is an experience I hope to never forget. It is so much more than I can comprehend or put into one page of words. It has drawn me closer to Jesus and gives me renewed ways of how I can help change the world one person at a time as I walk through this life with the Holy Trinity as my guide. "I cannot save humanity but, through the grace of God I can help humanity save themselves." Jesus, I trust in you

Our Mission Field Catholic School

Marquette Catholic School is dedicated to academic excellence formed in the teachings of Jesus Christ and the Sacramental life of the Catholic Church. Marquette nurtures each child's growth in knowledge, faith and Christian stewardship fostering a life of holiness and virtue.

Marquette Catholic School will open for its 109th year on Tuesday, September 3. All grades have been moved over to our new building on Chestnut Street in Virginia and will open September 3! We have had some incredibly dedicated volunteers in this moving process and continue to be amazed and grateful for God's guidance and provision as we move into another century of Catholic education.

Marquette serves students in grades PreK-8th. We have a unique four-day school week Monday-Thursday 7:45am-3:15pm and offer both before-care and after-care for students. We offer two preschool sections with options for 2, 3, or 4 day enrollments. Our elementary program (K-4) offers academics aligned to diocesan standards plus music, art, and physical education. We have developed a four year middle school program (5-8) that includes daily faith formation, human formation in our house system, project based learning, physical education, band, choir, and art. All of our programs (PreK, Elementary, and Middle) are taught by faithful and dedicated teachers.

We will be renewing our MNSAA accreditation this year and will need all of our mission field's input on how to make our school stronger and healthier. Please watch for information regarding that on our website, bulletins, and mailings. We are in the process of updating our website so please keep checking www.marquettecatholicschool.com for updates. You are all invited! We hope to showcase our beautiful new school at our Open House on Wednesday August 28th from 4:00-6:00pm. Once the school year begins, our daily mass schedule will be 10:40am for middle school students and 2:10pm for elementary students.



It Takes an Army

Rosie:

My faith journey was quite an easy one. My parents immigrated from Slovenia following World War II and spending 5 years in an Austrian refuge camp. They survived the war and were devout Catholics. We had a large family (12) and in many ways it was like an "army" that kept us faithful. Our parents and older siblings set such a wonderful witness of faith. We prayed before every meal, said the rosary every evening, went to daily Mass during Lent and never missed a Sunday Mass. Anchored in Faith Through Life's Storms

Born in Prebačevo, Slovenia, parishioner Leopolda (Bajda) Schutte began her life in 1936. With WWII ramping up in most of Europe, Yugoslavia began to feel the affects of war as communism increased its presence in her backyard. As a young child, Leopolda (Polda) living in Voklo, Slovenia with her family was forced by the Partisan's to evacuate to Austrian refugee camps where they would reside for 5 additional years. This included Polda's family, her parents Paul and Mary Bajda, as well as her five siblings. During this time in the refugee camps, the Bajda's recognized that they would never be able to return to their homeland and thus awaited patiently to be accepted into a new country where they could rebuild, the United States of America. In 1949 the generosity, diligence and kindness of many good Catholic families and priests helped to provide housing, food, and clothing to immigrating families. In the Badja's circumstance, this blessing came from Mr and Mrs. Martin Stephon aided by Fr. Schweiger and Fr. Dolsina, who provided access to those comforts as well as a job for Polda's father Paul, while the family assimilated into their new home in Elcor (right outside of Gilbert). Fully settled, the Bajda family grew into their new life on the Iron Range adding additional siblings resulting in a total of 12.

As Leopolda grew older she helped take care of the Bajda home and then worked at Arrow Shirt Factory until she married Vincent Ferkul at the age of 19. The couple moved to Cleveland and had 4 children - Vincent Jr., Martin, William and Erika. Upon Vincent Sr.'s untimely death due to cancer, she found herself widowed at age 26 with children all under 5 years old. Faith and family helped sustain the Ferkuls, as they moved back to Gilbert for support. In spite of these headwinds, Leopolda kept moving forward and met life's challenges with immense strength, as she went back to the Arrow Shirt factory to support her young family. Proudly, during that time, she bought the home she currently lives in today and ensured that all 4 children were able to attend school and assimilate back into the Gilbert community. Years later she met another wonderful man Rudolph (Rudy) Schutte, married and had another son, Steven. However amid this joy came new heartache, mining was in decline on the Iron Range and many lost their jobs, including Rudy. Making lemonade out of these lemons, Rudy and Polda along with her sibling Albina and husband Jim Ahlin purchased Koshars Sausage Kitchen. For the first couple of years they all worked together, but as life would have it Albina and Jim found employment in California leaving operations of Koshars to Polda and Rudy. If the stress of running a business and taking care of a family wasn't enough, Polda would endure more in the years to come. She was widowed a second time in 1988 upon the death of Rudy from cancer. Again, with faith as her anchor she rose to meet life's challenges and worked hard to maintain her business, while seeing her youngest child through school. She continued this work as a business owner for twenty years after Rudy's death, making Koshars a Gilbert destination, until selling it to her son William in the early 2000s. Today she remains an active part of the Gilbert community, with an especially close tie to the Gilbert Catholic Church. And, in spite of all of the sufferin
